#### **COMMUNITY PARTNER STORY**

As a bilingual, youth-led community monthly newspaper, the Richmond Pulse, presents local stories from Richmond, CA and Contra Costa County not covered by local or mainstream media. By specifically highlighting these communities, the paper creates a unified platform for the people who reside within them. Long before the Richmond Pulse was a community partner of Alive & Free, its publisher, Malcolm Marshall, attended Alive & Free in the early days of Club meetings. From his experience there, Malcolm is quite familiar with the young men and women who are seeking to have a voice in their community. The lessons he learned at those Club meetings coupled with the belief that he can expand what he and others can be is a mindset that he imparts to the people he connects with through the Richmond Pulse.

Through his community outlets, Malcolm carries on the tradition of giving young people hope and an opportunity to amplify their voice. As a resident, reporter, editor, and teacher, Malcolm works day in and day out with his team to sculpt the next generation of journalists and videographers. He also provides young people journalism training, giving young reporters a platform to be heard.



"Dr. Marshall, who is also my father, often expressed how important it is to know who you are and where you come from. That was the foundation upon which I grew the Richmond Pulse," adds Malcolm.

Malcolm is also integral to the success of Street Soldiers Radio, one of the most influential components of the Alive & Free mission. Street Soldiers Radio is now celebrating its 26th year of strengthening communities and shining the light on the violence that America's youth face on a daily basis. Mirroring much of what Alive & Free strives to accomplish, the Richmond Pulse extends the vision and mission of the Club. Using both the Richmond Pulse and Street Soldiers Radio to cross promote each other, as well as Alive & Free, the






community partnership is constantly expanding the reach that the Club enjoys.

"I want the focus of the paper to be an extension of Alive & Free. In true partnership, Alive & Free features our articles on Street Soldiers Radio. The Club also works with a variety of programs that the Richmond Pulse covers. It's very symbiotic," states Malcolm.

#### Office of Civic Engagement and Community Affairs/ DREAMSF

#### **COMMUNITY PARTNER STORY**

A partnership that has existed almost 15 years continues today as the Office of Civic Engagement & Immigrant Affairs (OCEIA) collaborates with Alive & Free to mentor the Bay Area youth. As a policy, compliance, direct services and grant-making organization, OCEIA's mission is to promote inclusive policies and foster immigrant assistance programs that lead to full civic, economic and linguistic integration. Alive & Free works with many of OCEIA's field employees, fellows and partners providing training and consulting through its nationally renowned Alive & Free programs.

Over the years, the Office of Civic Engagement & Immigrant Affairs has partnered with Alive & Free on safety and educational initiatives. In 2007, Adrienne Pon, the Executive Director of OCEIA, worked with Dr. Marshall and the Mayor's Office of Community Development on San Francisco's citywide Violence Prevention Plan. In 2010, the two parties connected again to develop the Community Ambassadors, a safety and workforce development program.

One of the most rewarding programs the partners have invested in is The DREAMSF Fellowship. It is a year-long leadership and professional development opportunity for



immigrant students (ages 18+) who seek to be social justice change-makers in the San Francisco Bay Area. The program offers a network of mentors and hands-on experience, career exploration, and a culturally relevant immersion to increase leadership and professional development opportunities of young immigrants.

"Our goal is to increase the number of professionals entering the workforce who have the cultural competency and high-level skills necessary to create impactful change for San Francisco/Bay Area residents," says Director Pon. "Alive & Free helps us do that by providing the Fellows both violence prevention training (the Alive & Free Prescription) and financial literacy competency (Alive & Financially Free). Both trainings are extremely impactful to our program participants as the materials are relevant and allow Fellows to understand themselves through a new lens."

Looking forward, the organization's Fellows program will continue to partner with Alive & Free for the 2019 – 2020 cohort of fellows. "Together, we plan to continue sharing and shaping their vision of a safe, engaged and inclusive San Francisco where everyone can contribute and thrive," says Dr. Marshall.

#### DREAMSF Alumni

DREAMSF Fellow, Deirel Marquez-Perez is an Alive & Free College Graduate

Deirel Marquez-Perez became a DREAMSF Fellow in the summer of 2016. "I applied to the program to gain a paid professional experience." Right about the same time, she learned about Alive & Free. One of the Club's college graduates told her how motivating and supportive the program had been for her, and also about the financial assistance the Club provided for college.

Deirel was interested and began attending Alive & Free's Tuesday night Leadership Academy classes and the Thursday night College Prep Class. "I was in both programs—DREAMSF and Alive & Free—at the same time and reaping the benefits of both." In the fall of 2017, she entered UC Berkeley after earning an AA degree at City College of San Francisco.



Alive & Free had a powerful impact on her - Ms. Demetra's Financially Alive & Free Class in particular. Deirel had already created a financial literacy component for the DREAMSF Fellows and Ms. Demetra's class helped to refine it even more. "Ms. Demetra taught me to investigate the personal relationship we have with money and the ways that impacts our financial habits and attitudes." Eventually, she had Ms. Demetra do a Financially Alive & Free Training for all the DREAMSF Fellows. Deirel graduated from UC Berkeley in the spring of 2019 with a degree in Global Studies. She is interested in economic policy with a focus on alleviating inequality and poverty.

"The DREAMSF Fellowship program provided me with the professional development experience I needed to launch my career in financial empowerment and economic justice work," she says. "And Alive & Free supported me financially through my academic journey at UC Berkeley."

#### Mike Gibson

Don't Let Your Circumstances
Dictate Your Behavior

Growing up in East Oakland, Michael Gibson's childhood was marred by drug related violence in his community and in his family. Caught up in the streets and entangled at a young age, he was serving a sentence in a youth correctional facility when he was introduced to the African American Males Transition Program there. That positive influence spurred Michael to read and to write about his experiences, and in time led to an early parole. After his release in an attempt to keep out of trouble, Michael joined Alive & Free/ Omega Boys Club.

THE PRINCIPLES I LEARNED THERE HAVE BEEN THE FOUNDATION FOR THE MEANING & MISSION OF MY WORK. - Mike Gibson At Alive & Free, Michael learned the value of his life. When asked about what he wanted to do moving forward, he indicated that he wanted an opportunity to use his prior negative experiences for good. From there, Dr. Marshall encouraged him to think bigger. Over time, he became confident enough to seek attendance at HBCUs across the country and picked Morehouse College in Atlanta, GA. There, he put to use all the tools he had learned at Alive & Free and graduated with a BA in English and Drama. He then went on to get his Masters in Public Administration from Cal State East Bay.

He no longer allowed his circumstances to dictate his behavior.

"Mike is a special person," says Dr.

Marshall. "He's been through a lot and for him to come through all of that and be the role model and family man he is now is really something. I remember all the nights I use to drive him home from the Club



and all the wonderful conversations we had. He never gave up, no matter what setbacks he experienced. He is such an inspiration to all the young people who have come after him at Alive & Free."

Michael has shared his life story countless times all over the country and speaks about his experience with Alive & Free and the impact the program had on his life. That impact influenced his own passion to create programs to shape the community. Inspired by Alive & Free's core value – "The more you know, the more you owe" – Michael has been instrumental in the development of several mentorship





programs, including the Positive Minds Project at the Mentoring Center. He now owns a professional coaching consulting business and leads the Emergency Medical Services Corps (EMS Corps) in Alameda County, an award-winning program that prepares young men for careers in Emergency Medical Services.

Michael knows the power of transformational leadership and allows that to influence the meaning and mission of his current work. He credits Dr. Marshall's encouragement towards Morehouse with getting him out of a troubled environment in Oakland--and keeping him Alive and Free!



#### **Omar Butler**

#### **Stability is the New Normal**

Dreaming can be difficult in the shadows of gang and drug violence, as it was for Omar Butler growing up in the Hunter's Point neighborhood of San Francisco. Even with a good group of like-minded friends, ideas of success were not very clear. Desire for economic stability and social mobility stagnated without a clear path for how to move forward, until a friend introduced him to Alive & Free.


Known then as Omega Boys Club, Omar joined the program as a junior in high school. Neighborhood pressures mounting, he says he joined at a critical time when he "could have gone either way in search for stability." Alive & Free normalized the idea of college and success through positive means. It offered brotherhood and fellowship, which for a young boy like Omar, was transformational. The relationships he formed with mentors Dr. Marshall and Jack Jacqua, as well as fellow members, would prove to be a lifelong inspiration that still influences the work he does today.

"Omar was one of the early ones. He was one of the first to go off to college and prove that Alive & Free really worked. He helped to set the example for all of those who have come after him," says Dr. Marshall.

Omar says that the Omega Boys Club provided college access before the term was coined and is one of the reasons why he is so passionate about the work he does. "The club provided a safe space for me to explore options. It made it okay to want to go to college, it made it okay to not want to sell drugs, it made it normal to want to be around positive people. It changed my life because it created a new normal for me because I didn't have to apologize for who I was and it was okay to be me."

After attending college at Tuskegee University in Alabama and finishing up at Long Beach State, where he says he gained independence stepping outside his comfort zone, he returned to the Bay Area. Omar says that he always knew that he wanted to give back to the community and he is doing just that as the Regional Executive Director for College Track Northern California, a national college completion organization focused on guiding students to and supporting them through college. While he acknowledges that education is transformational, he maintains that it's the relationships, particularly with trusted adults, that help

students like him overcome challenges and change their trajectory for life.

Honoring Dr. Marshall's hard work by carrying forward the mantra of "the more you know, the more you owe" through his work, Omar is still involved with Alive & Free as his work with College Track allows him to collaborate periodically.

### **Diane** Thomas, M.D.

Alive, Free, & Paying It Forward

Dr. Diane Thomas' story was not uncommon for the Hunter's Point neighborhood where she was born. With a father on drugs and a single mother parenting four children, the neighborhood pressure of gang violence, deaths of friends, and the threat of teen pregnancy were all too real. Then, just as she entered high school a friend introduced her to Alive & Free.

"I grew up in Hunter's Point, surrounded by drugs and violence. My mother always stressed the importance of education and I knew that I wanted more for myself. So I was book smart but I was also street smart. With that being said, I initially began attending Omega (A&F) just to see what all the "hype" was about. At first I was not thrilled but after about a month of attending I became more intrigued. The classes made me think on a deeper level about life, friends, myself and my future. The nightly meetings were my favorite. I do not like public speaking, but at the meetings I could be myself and not worry about being judged. Many times other students shared their own experiences and



I could definitely relate. It was encouraging to know that others were experiencing similar issues. Dr. Marshall was like a second father figure for me. I like people to tell me things straight up and not sugar coat it; and Dr. Marshall did just that. Omega was and always has been an extended family for me."

Dr. Thomas says she knew from her first visit that Alive & Free was different- a safe place, an inspirational place. Dr. Thomas encouraged other friends to attend as well and steered clear of the stereotypical neighborhood influences like drugs and violence. Empowered with the message that no matter your background, you can pursue your dreams, Dr. Thomas went on to attend medical school at Meharry



Medical College, complete a surgical residency, and return to the Bay Area to open Merced Women's Center for Advanced Pelvic Surgery. Her commitment to providing healthcare to underserved communities can be linked to her pay it forward attitude that she acquired from Alive & Free.

Throughout her time with Alive & Free, Dr. Marshall's refrain, "the more you know, the more you owe" would not only stick with her but become the

catalyst for her own efforts to engage and pass on lessons to others from a similar background through residency mentorships, student job shadowing programs, and involvement with other first generation college students.

She encounters many people who are surprised by her background, given her successful career and personal life, but she stresses the importance of using her position as an African American woman,

surgeon, and business owner to show the younger generation what is possible. Since she has returned to the Merced, California area she continues to support her local community and Alive & Free.



In summer of 1993, meeting Dr. Marshall and Jack Jacqua would change everything. From the moment he arrived, Shamann was confronted with a hard truth: Every decision has consequences - a lesson he had yet to learn. At Alive & Free, Shamann was empowered to reflect upon the people in his life and the boundaries he was failing to create that would shield him from danger. "Decision making is the number one thing I took away from Alive & Free. As basic as it sounds, I had to relearn how to surround myself with enhancers. I simply needed to not choose bad people over what's best for me." In every part of his life, he still shares the Alive & Free Rule for Living: that "a friend will never lead you to danger" - applying that to politics, friends, family and even in his parenting.



Alive & Free helped to show Shamann the meaning of self-awareness and personal value. He was given instruction to change behavior and forgive himself for making mistakes, something he had never given himself permission to do. As Shamann began to mature and come to understand that it takes just a second to create a long-term effect, he started to consider college a possibility. He knew that education would be the way out and the key to a bright future. He eventually earned a scholarship from Alive & Free to attend college at Morris Brown in Atlanta where he earned his BA in political science. A few years later he received his MA in Public Administration from San Francisco State.

Today, the formerly troubled teen still remembers where he came from, but he refuses to take his eyes off of where he is going. Now equipped with the tools to succeed, Shamann has dedicated his life to public service. In 2014, he was elected to the school board and served as Board President during his tenure there. And in 2018, he was elected to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors as now serves as the City's Supervisor for District 10. Amazing!

Congratulations, Shamann! We can't wait to see what's next.

#### From Juvenile Hall to City Hall

Sometimes remembering where you came from is the first thing you want to forget. As a young man, Shamann Walton loved learning. The only problem was that for most of his teenage years, the streets were his classroom. Turf wars, gang violence led to Shamann being expelled from school several times and spending time in juvenile hall. "When I was introduced to Alive & Free through the Omega Boys Club in Vallejo, California, higher education wasn't even a thought for me," explains Shamann.

My dad died when I was attending, and my friends who were there really supported me, as well as Dr. Marshall during that time. I learned about having a sense of worthiness and exploring what you can add to the community, what you add to the world. It was a nice segue before attending Hampton University, where I earned my Bachelors and Masters degrees. I've also been to South Africa where I taught teachers how to run a classroom. "It was an amazing experience for me because Alive & Free provided a space for young people to be vulnerable and to get educated at the same time. "I was born and raised in the San Francisco Bay Area and was part of the first family of The Omega Boys Club. Back then, it was really about saving lives. It was just a great place to come and really hear the stories of kids like us. Growing up in those times and with the drug dealers and things like that, honestly, it was all we knew. Ironically, both of my brothers were going to the Club and got arrested on the exact same day. I went to Omega to speak on their behalf, and I never left. The journey has been amazing. So, coming to the Club and hearing stories and having space was amazing. There were a lot of tears and a lot of prayers at that time. I ended up going to San Francisco State University and did my undergraduate degree there. I received my graduate degree from University of San Francisco." – Veronica





"I started going to the Omega Boys Club (Alive & Free) when I was very young. I had to be 11 or 12. My mom started going to the Boys club because she wanted to do something for the community that we were living in. During my time there, I realized that everybody has a story and not everybody has the same kind of home life that I had. I learned very early on to appreciate the situation that I was born into. Omega felt like a family full of big brothers and big sisters that were also looking out for me and trying to give me a little bit of game about things. "I came to Omega at a time when I was pretty broken but wasn't aware how broken I was. At the time, my brother had been murdered in 2005 and since then I had just disassociated from reality and I really wasn't myself. I probably haven't even been myself until last year. With trauma, your brain and trauma, it really has a strong connection and I think that's what influenced me into going into psychology. I knew that I was always going to go to college and when I was given the opportunity to go to Omega I said, 'why not?' I graduated from Spelman College in

2013 with a BA in psychology and then applied and got my Masters and Doctorate degrees. I am now working at a psychiatric hospital inside of a prison. It's an interesting dynamic being the only black female psychologist in my facility working with primarily African American males. It's a different experience for both the inmates and the staff. It's very important and needed work though. I've learned a lot about myself along the way. Omega hasbeen there through most of my traumatic experiences and has helped me stay grounded." — Daija




positive impact he has seen in the lives of the community's youth. He has also noticed that the organization has grown and is reaching further than it ever has.


